Accompaniments involve bringing the person to and from appointments. The relationship that develops over time between the PHAs and the volunteers/staff allows us to link them to other resources to meet their other needs. Mainline Needle Exchange	In hospital settings there remain significant gaps and opportunities to reach people who use drugs (PWUD) who are at risk of HIV. It may also be difficult to practice safer drug use while hospitalized, due to abstinence-based/punitive policies, lack of awareness by providers, and limited privacy.
