Mothers and sons – both biological and chosen – share a complicated, yet beautifully unique bond, one unlike any other. Mothers can be made; and mothers can be chosen. A person can have one mother, or they can have many. The mothers we have, the mothers we hold, and the mothers we keep change and shape us into who we become. They help us find ourselves and navigate the storms.

Much like mothers, sons can also be chosen or biological. Our sons motivate and change us too. They push us into new spaces and build with us in our relationships, in our hearts, our homes, and in our communities.

It's not always easy and sometimes there are mistakes. We can't always find each other and we don't always love each other in the ways that we wish to be loved, but the important thing is that we keep trying. That we keep listening and asking questions that allow us to more fully know that person. To be curious and present enough to be in constant conversation with the person they are and the one they are trying to become.

Mother to Son is an initiative to foster, lift up and expand the conversations between mothers and sons in order to amplify the bond of Black and Latinx gay/bisexual and queer men and their mother/maternal figures, as well as highlight this network as an essential source of support for wellness – including getting men engaged, reengaged, and retained in HIV prevention and care. It seeks to imagine them in ways that reflect how they wish to be seen and how they wish for the world to see their mother/son. This book is an illustration of this relationship and an exploration of conversations of support including language and examples to support you in having yours.

Each of the mother-son pairs featured in this booklet were given a set of questions aimed at uncovering some of the nuances of the maternal bond, and how it connects to the sexual health of Black and Latinx gay, bisexual, trans and queer men. How do maternal figures and their sons see each other?

For some mothers, the bond begins before their sons even take their first breath. For other mothers, their sons are reborn when they find someone to step into the gap

and love them like no other. In each other's eyes, maternal figures and sons are a beacon of light and care – a loving embrace and constant voice of encouragement.

WELL, SON, I'LL TELL YOU: LIFE FOR ME AIN'T BEEN NO CRYSTAL STAIR...




YOSIMAR I think she is proud of me. I want her to feel that her immigration to this country was worth it. I want her to feel proud that I am a reflection of her teachings.

DIANE I wish everyone knew the love he had for his family, and saw him as the person that he is loving and humble.





GIA Honestly, their Relationships both friendships and romantic - are difficult. I'm very protective and sometimes I am a little hard on them because I don't want my babies to get their heart broken.



BLAIR & LUNA

BLAIR After my mom passed away, I had some demons in my heart. Luna definitely helped me overcome that.

LUNA We talk about everything and we both give each other amazing advice. What wasn't easy was when he lost his mom - his mom loved me too - due to Covid in 2020. It was so sudden and we were both so scared, hopeless and we didn't know what was coming. It just wasn't an easy topic. All we could do was talk about the great moments.



DARNELL The day I told her that I was gay was the most difficult conversation I've had with her. It was only difficult because I feared that she would reject me. But everything I had come to know about her was the opposite - so I only made it difficult for myself.



TY The most difficult conversation for me was telling her I was gay at the age of 22. I was afraid of the unknown outcome, but it was life-changing.



YOSIMAR It's difficult to talk about her traumas. I tell her that I do not want her legacy to be suffering, I want her to tell me about the happy memories she has also had in this lifetime.

MARDONIA I wish I had more to give him.
I am sad that when he was in
college I could not help. We
were trying to survive so I am
sure he felt alone a lot.

DEVIN I've learned patience from Gia, and I would never have had the emotional growth that I've seen in my life without her support. Our communication and our love for each other will never change.



DEVANTE Her support has been everything for me. I think our strongest aspect is simply our friendship.

GIA My favorite memory of them is simply waking up in the morning to see my babies on the sofa sleeping so peacefully because they know they are safe.

BLAIR I was actually a troubled teen – I used to fight a lot and get into trouble all the time. I did some things I regret in life, but after meeting Luna I learned that I'm better than all that. I learned to put myself first – and if I didn't have Luna in my life there probably wouldn't be a ME.



LUNA My favorite memory of him is everytime I see him. We're a chosen family but the love I have for him is like I made him myself. Interesting enough I am both mother and father to him. He calls me either role depending on the situation. Being his mother hasn't changed me much – if anything – I think it softened me up to being more patient, because he's a handful.



YOSIMAR Abuela has taught me that hard work and persistence will eventually pay off. But most importantly, she taught me about FAITH. Always ask God first, and watch everything fall into place. I am who I am because Abuela allowed me to explore, play, and be creative. She nourished me, she raised me, and now that I am older I am her primary caretaker – I get to celebrate her, shower her with love and let people know what a great woman she is.

MARDONIA He was a little helper. I haven't felt alone because I have him. I am in this country because of him. I feel like if I return to Mexico I am going to miss him too much. Being a mother to him was hard - very hard - but I am proud that my kids and grandkids are good people.

DARNELL My mother taught me that love should always be my weapon of choice. She's become more of a best friend... a confidante...as much as she is a mother.







TY My mom has been fighting cancer for some time now, so my continued prayers are the priority


— I hope and pray that I give her happiness and peace of mind.

DARNELL I hope to live my life as a material reminder of her mothering me into the person that I am.




Sometimes I get sad. My status as an undocumented person makes me feel that I am stuck. To her I am successful but in my eyes there are so many glass ceilings.

MARDONIA I want people to respect him. He is a great human, and I know he worries a lot.


I just want people to know he wants to have a good impact on the world.

Sexual health can be a challenging conversation for both maternal figures and sons. But the relationship between mothers, chosen mothers, and their sons should be a safe space to start these conversations early in life.



With an open, genuine, and judgment-free approach, sons can feel more comfortable in sharing the more intimate aspects of their sexual lives - their status, their safe sex practices, and even their sexual orientation. Just like any other difficult conversation, the maternal bond is stronger than any imagined obstacles –

it's an essential and critical support for getting men connected, engaged, and retained in HIV care and other health services.

DARNELL As a family, we didn't talk about sex in general - much of those conversations likely happened in quiet, trusting spaces but not in a way that normalized sex talk. I wish we could have had more space to talk freely, honestly, but I have talked about my status. We are better now in ways that benefit the generations behind us, however.

DIANE I told him to be safe. Really it's not difficult to talk about, and we don't always talk specifically about sexual health, but I just always say be safe.

CONNIE We have an open relationship
where we can talk about him
being gay, and how he must always
protect himself first and foremost.
After losing several of his close
friends, he had to educate himself
carefully about HIV prevention.

yesimer gasina Madoma YOSIMAR She just tells me to protect myself, to be aware of how I do things. Health is important, so she has always encouraged me to visit doctors and learn about medications. When we watch TV and see conversations around condoms and medication she does not always get it, but simply states that as long as I take care of myself she is happy.

MARDONIA I tell him to protect himself, be careful and focus on the bigger picture. There is much out there that sometimes I do not get but I respect it.

BLAIR Luna is an open book, so mother shares all knowledge especially about sexual health.

LUNA We've talked about sexual health since day one. Actually when we met, I was doing safer sex workshops. I've shared my status with him and he's learned many things from my experiences living with HIV. Sex and safer sex is a regular conversation with us. It's never difficult.



Honestly, we are so open and genuine with each other that these conversations are super easy, and a part of our everyday conversation.


TY Her will to continue to fight to live with cancer makes me so proud!


BLAIR I'm so proud of how smart Luna is – there's never a dull conversation. She's so passionate about people, especially when mother loves someone.
